From the Pastor March 13, 2016 Fifth Sunday in Lent First Sunday of the Passion

#### **DEATH OF MY MOTHER**

Last week I wrote of my mother's passing on February 21<sup>st</sup> and I once more wish to extend sincere gratitude on behalf of my family and myself for all the cards, Mass intentions, and kindnesses that you have all so graciously given to us.

So many have asked if there is anything they could do. My family and I have requested that donations be made *In Loving memory of Marie R. Pereda* to the Little Sisters of the Poor, Queen of Peace Residence, 110-30 221<sup>st</sup>, Queens Village, NY 11429.

So many who came to my mother's wake asked about the white linen cloth which was wrapped tenderly in her hands along with the Rosary. That linen cloth is called the *manuturgium* and it is used in the Rite of the Ordination of Priests. Usually the ordination ceremony is quite lengthy (my own was 3 hours long for there were 14 of us ordained that day). At one point of the lengthy ceremony the ordaining Bishop anoints the hands of the new priest with the sacred chrism, the holy oil that is also used in baptism and confirmation. The hands are completely outlined in the Sacred Chrism as a sign that they will offer sacrifice to God. Then the new priest's hands are tied with the long linen strip. Then the chrism is cleansed from the hands with the same pure white linen cloth that is long in shape. It has usually been made by a religious sister. The cloth is then never used again, but it is an ancient custom that the mother of the priest is buried with that cloth around her own hands. She, who gave God a priest, now brings the cloth with the sacred oils to her own grave. That linen cloth which I had saved for 35 years is now buried in the earth with my mother at Holy Rood Cemetery.

## ST. JOSPEH AND ST. PATRICK

For our meditation of today I would like to depart from our Lenten meditations and consider two saints whose feast will occur this week St. Joseph and St. Patrick.

The Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary is kept on the 19<sup>th</sup> of March. Although it occurs in Lent the priest puts away the somber violet of this season and wears the joyful white vesture. The Gloria, absent since Ash Wednesday, is prayed at the Mass.

As we all know St. Joseph was chosen from all eternity to be the guardian of the Redeemer. Although he was not physically the father of Our Lord Jesus Christ, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary, in every other way he was a father to Our Lord. As he was the protector of the Holy Family on earth, so is he the patron of the Universal Church. We should pray to St. Joseph each day to help us in every need both in the spiritual order and the material order.

Very often we may see paintings and images of St. Joseph which depict him as elderly. This depiction, while well intentioned, is very far from accurate. At the time of Our Lord's birth St. Joseph would have been about 19 years old, in the full vigor of manhood and strength. After all, God Our Lord would never have entrusted His Divine Son to the care of one who would not have been physically capable of fulfilling his mission as Guardian of the Redeemer. We understand why pious artists would have depicted St. Joseph as elderly – it

would have been to emphasize the perpetual virginity of Our Blessed Mother. But we must always remember that Holy Purity is not a virtue not only for the elderly, but for the young also. Holy Purity in fact leads to one always being young of heart and filled with physical strength and strength of will. *I will go unto the altar of God; the God who gives joy to my youth!* 

St. Joseph was not physically the father of Our Lord Jesus Christ, but in every way, other than the physical, he was a father to Our Lord. The way Our Lord held the hammer, the way he planed the wood, the way he finished off a cabinet – these all reflected the influence of St. Joseph. I once remember asking a contractor why he hammered the crown molding in a certain way that I had never seen before. He did not give me a lengthy or complicated answer. He simply said, *because that is the way my master taught me*. And Our Lord would have done his work as his master and guardian, St. Joseph, taught Him.

St. Joseph has always been the intercessor and protector of Christians. Blessed Pope Pius IX proclaimed him the Protector of the Universal Church. Pope Saint John XXIII placed his name in the Roman Canon and the present Holy Father, Pope Francis, placed his name in all the Eucharistic prayers of the Church. The Little Sisters of the Poor, with whom I lived for 13 years, had such confidence in St. Joseph that they would simply write on a piece of paper what it was they needed to care for their dear old people, and place the note under the statue of St. Joseph, and he would always grant their prayer, whether it was a spiritual need or a material need. Whenever storms approached, they placed the statue of St. Joseph in the window looking out. We now follow that custom at the rectory and I would recommend that practice to all of you.

To many of the saints God has given the grace to assist us in various ways. But St. Joseph assists and protects us in every way. In my 33 years as a priest he has helped me in innumerable ways, particularly at the time of his feast day, March 19<sup>th</sup>. Each Wednesday is dedicated to St. Joseph and the entire month of March is dedicated to him

As everyone is well aware on Thursday we will celebrate the Feast of St. Patrick, a saint very dear to us. I have always had a special veneration for St. Patrick and have visited many places associated with his life both in France and in Ireland.

Many think of St. Patrick as a mythic figure, but he was a true and living person. St. Patrick was born and raised in a Christian family on the west coast of Britain in what is today Wales. He was a citizen of the Roman Empire and his first language was Latin. At a young age he was captured in a raid upon his beloved British coast and taken to Ireland. At the time Ireland was not a part of the Roman Empire and had not embraced the faith. St. Patrick was treated in a cruel manner by those who had captured him. However, this did not fill him with bitterness and hatred but brought him closer to God. He learned the language of the people, and vowed to God that he would work for the conversion of the Irish peoples if ever he had the opportunity to do so. He understood that much of their cruelty was borne of the fact that they had not come under the Mercy of God and of His Beloved Son.

Patrick eventually escaped from Ireland and made his way to the island of Lerins off the coast of Marseilles in France. There he remained for two years praying and studying at a Cicerstian Abbey. He was ordained a Bishop there. I have visited that abbey which is still in existence and there is a beautiful memorial plaque to St. Patrick on the island declaring, *From hence did Blessed Patrick depart to convert the Irish People*.

After returning to Ireland, Patrick did great penances on an island at Lough Derg. I myself have visited the island. The custom even to this day is to remain there for three days doing penance. The pilgrims are barefoot and fasting for three days. The first night is spent in vigil but one is permitted to sleep during the second night.

Finally. St. Patrick, seeing his wonderful work of bringing the grace of the redemption to the people of Ireland fell asleep in the Lord in 461 in Downpatrick in what is now Northern Ireland. I have prayed at his tomb which is on the grounds of the Protestant Cathedral. *Dear St. Patrick, pray for us and give to us the grace never to become bitter in the hardships of life, but rather ever to rejoice in the gift of the redemption.* 

### FEASIBILITY STUDY

Thank you for returning the questionnaire that was part of our feasibility study. If you have not received one they are still available in the Church. I have been most encouraged by the magnanimity of our parishioners who wish to do something beautiful for God on the occasion of our celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the building of the Church.

#### THE LOCATION OF THE TABERNACLE (CONTINUED)

This week I continue to explain the location of the tabernacle within the Church. It is my fond hope that these little teachings are helping to make everything *explicable* instead of *inexplicable*.

Canon 938.2 of the Code of Canon Law reads: *The Tabernacle in which the Blessed Eucharist is reserved should be sited in the most distinguished place in a Church or oratory, a place which is the most conspicuous, suitably adorned and conducive to prayer.* Consequently each Pastor may wish to look at the location of the tabernacle in his church and ask himself whether this is really the "most distinguished place... conspicuous, suitably adorned and conducive to prayer." It is for that reason that at St. Agnes Cathedral, the tabernacle was recently relocated to the central place in the sanctuary.

Until 1967 there was no need to conjecture about this topic because by law the tabernacle had to be ... *reserved in a solid, burglar-proof tabernacle in the center of the high altar of the sanctuary*..." However between the years 1967 and 1985 as an experiment it was permitted to place the tabernacle in another suitable place in the Church. It is for that reason that the original design of St. Paul's Church locates the Tabernacle in the center of the sanctuary but when it was completed the location had been moved. The only difference between now and then, is that no one would have explained anything to the faithful; they would simply have done what they wanted without any consultation or explanation.

This experimentation ended in 1985 with the promulgation of Pope St. John Paul II's instruction *Inaestimable Donum* in which the Pope called for the restoration of the ancient practice of the tabernacle having the central and most prominent location in the Church. Those years between 1967 and 1985 had sadly revealed a great lack of reverence toward the Most Blessed Sacrament. It was soon apparent that whatever good may have been intended in moving the Location of the Blessed Eucharist, it was a failure. From all over the world came sad reports of loss of awareness of and reverence toward the Blessed Eucharist. Far from leading to greater faith and love for the Blessed Eucharist, the practice of shunting the Tabernacle to the side only led to loss of faith and reverence for the Blessed Eucharist.

Here at St. Paul, the Blessed Eucharist is not located in the most conspicuous or prominent place. It cannot be seen from the north transept of the Church at all and from other locations in the Church. What is most conspicuous and most prominent in our church is the priest who must even step **down** to the Altar of God. How curious is that movement, particularly when one remembers what King David wrote in *Psalm 42: I will go up to the Alter of God*.

I will continue to explain this enhancement to our church as I will all the enhancements. However, for the next two weeks (Palm Sunday and Easter) I will write on these central mysteries of our redemption.

Today one will notice the Passion cloth covering the Cross and statues in our Church and Chapel. This is a dramatic reminder that now we have moved into the most holy time of the year. The Gospel tells us, *and Jesus hid himself.* "May the Passion cloth remind us to live in intimate union with Our Savior as He endures His most Sacred Passion.

And on a closing note may I just bring to your attention a financial statistic that concerns us all. Thanks be to God, this winter was much less severe than last year's. There were only 4 occasions when we needed plowing. Last year we changed companies so that we could save a sizable amount in snow removal. However, our total cost for snow removal this winter (and I am assuming there will be no more snow storms) came to \$11,495.00. Our total collected in the second collections for snow removal this year was \$1,112.00. (Last winter, you will recall, was much more severe. Our total of snow removal was \$24,713.00 and total collected for snow removal was \$2,692.00) We pray each Sunday for **seasonable** weather...perhaps we should be praying during the winter months for **unseasonable weather** so that we will have no snow at all! This explains why we have second collections each week.

# IFast And<br/>AbstinenceCHURCH REGULATIONS<br/>REGARDING FAST AND<br/>ABSTINENCE

Abstinence from meat (beast or fowl) is to be observed by <u>all Catholics</u> fourteen years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent. This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

Fasting means limiting oneself to one full meal on a given fast day. <u>Catholics who are eighteen years</u> of age but not yet fifty-nine are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On fast days, two additional smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength. However, the two smaller meals together may not equal one full meal. Moreover, eating solid foods between meals on fast days is not permitted.
