FROM THE PASTOR JUNE 18, 2023 THE ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDIANARY TIME THE THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Dear Parishioners:

May I first offer sincere best wishes, congratulations, and promise of prayers to all the fathers of our parish on this Fathers' Day. May the good St. Joseph be our inspiration and strength in these trying times for our nation and the Church. It is to the father of the family that God has granted the mission of protection and governance. May God bless all as you protect the holy purity of your daughters and the strength of your sons.

It seems that June is the month when we first feel the presence of summer. The long days and warm weather uplift us. No wonder then that the month of June is the month of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Our Lord's most loving Heart warms the cold of our hardened hearts, so steeped in pride, the gravest sin and that of the devil. This event, which is the principal Fundraiser for St. Paul the Apostle, is held at the Engineers' Club in Roslyn. This year it was held on June 5th.

Chris and Joie Marie Hein have been parishioners of St. Paul for many years, and most generous parishioners. They are part of a large extended family.
